Dear Members:

Some of you miss the 1818 Society Newsletter, which was a lively document that shared interesting information among members. You might like to see this Bulletin evolve on the lines of the Newsletter. However, I would like to mention that while the printed Newsletter has been discontinued for efficiency and economy (and environmental) reasons, its laudable purpose can be even better served by the 1818 Society website. This has a Members' Connections feature through which members can share

information, exchange ideas and work towards common purpose with other members on a wide range of subjects. The 1818 Website and its Members' Connections feature has considerable potential that is unexploited.

May I suggest that members visit our website at worldbank.org/1818, enter the Members' Connections feature and start conversations (and arguments) and develop activities on subjects that interest them. Once a critical level of activity is generated, the benefits we got from the Newsletter, and much more, can be gained through the Members' Connections feature. The Society on its part, with Zafar Ahmad in the lead, is working with Bank EXT to make the Website more attractive for members to visit by providing access through it to Bank information and knowledge that would respond to the needs of members.

Meanwhile, the Bulletin, ably managed by Sverrir, will continue to focus on its main purpose of being a channel of communication between 1818 Society and its members and will also be used to promote greater member participation on the Website.

The ANZ retreat in April, which I had the privilege of attending, was a remarkable event. It combined social, intellectual and tourism aspects in an optimal way and its organizers and participants did well to involve the Bank's Country Director fully in the event. Not only was there a

fascinating workshop on the Pacific Islands, but the contours of a Senior (Alumni) Professional Associate program for these Islands was also finalized. The UK reunion at Eastbourne in early May was also a highly successful event with over 60 participants and an attractive program of activities. The social synergy generated was truly impressive. Each Chapter reunion has developed a unique brand image. We can look forward to the German, French and Dutch reunions in September

The Chief Economist of the Bank, Dr Justin Lin, gave a brilliant talk to the Alumni Forum on April 9th on the global economic and financial crisis. It was a refreshingly clear and candid account of what went wrong and how the situation can be remedied. The large audience appreciated the talk very much and it is now available on our website for those who missed it. While on the subject of the global crisis, many of us worry about our pensions. We have placed Stephen Eccles' recent presentation on this subject to the management committee on the Website so that his solid assessment of the status of our Pension Funds can be more broadly shared with members.

The next Alumni event is on June 11th, when the Vice President, Ms. Katherine Sierra, will talk to us about Climate Change. That event will also be covered by our Website so that outstation members can listen to it. In the month of May, we expect participatory workshops on Estate Taxes, Income Taxes and Medical Insurance to attract strong member participation. The Society is also organizing trips to Annapolis and planning a trip to New York in December. There appears to be good demand for such workshops and trips. Suggestions for future activities from members are always welcome.

And please remember that our Summer Dinner is on July 1st and that this year's Annual Meeting followed by a Dinner, will take place on October 21st, 2009.

Finally, it is with great sadness that I report that our colleague, Richard Clements, died in a bicycle accident on April 27th, 2009. Richard was the editor of the 1818 Society's Newsletter from 1991 to 1993. The Newsletter under Richard's guidance was filled with retiree news and it appeared regularly every four months. During this period he transformed the Newsletter from a small, typewritten publication with a somewhat erratic publishing schedule to a 20-24 page publication that was produced on a word processor...a task no less formidable than the current migration from printed paper to an electronic website. Richard quit his editorship when he moved to Florida in late 1993, but in 1996 he founded the Florida Chapter. He remained in charge of the Chapter until the end of 2005. The Society owes Richard a great debt of gratitude for his contributions to the organization. An obituary celebrating Richard's life is posted on the Society's website. Richard's friends will gather for a celebration of his life on what would have been his 76th birthday on June 27th, 2009 at the Quince Orchard Park Community Center, 500 Highland Ridge Ave, Gaithersburg, MD 20878, from 3pm to 5pm.

Meeting in Wellington, New Zealand

The meeting of the ANZ Chapter in April was the first to be held in New Zealand sealing the bond across the Tasman Sea (colloquially and affectionately, known as the Ditch). It brought together colleagues and their partners from Australia and New Zealand and the pleasure of being hosts to visitors from the United Kingdom and Shiva and his wife Charu from DC. Nigel Roberts, Country Director for Timor Leste, Papua New Guinea and the Pacific Islands, was also welcomed.

A major feature of the meeting was a seminar on governance and development in the Pacific at the University of Victoria. Participants in the discussion included interested academics, representatives of NGOs and civil society, in addition to the Bank alumni. Nigel Roberts led the discussion on development with an incisive analysis of development issues faced by these emerging countries.

Chapter members also discussed the potential contribution they could make through a Senior Professional Associate program for Pacific Island countries. Changes affecting NZaid arising from the recent change in government in New Zealand were also mentioned, as was possible networking with NGOs by individual members of the Chapter.

The Royal Yacht Club in Wellington lived up to its reputation and provided a gourmet dinner enlivened by chatter among old and new friends. Some Chapter members and guests went on to Martinborough, north of Wellington, one of New Zealand leading pinot noir areas. Those who went on to beautiful Queenstown had the opportunity of tasting the pinot noir of Central Otago, the other contender for the production of the best pinot noir in new world vineyards, if not the whole world, according to the locals. The mountains, glacial lakes, fiords and changing light in this area are dramatic.

All this led to a demand for future Chapter meetings in New Zealand: the land of the big white cloud.

The earlier announced principal speaker, Mr Claude Mandil, could unfortunately not attend because of illness. His place was filled by two Society members. First, Alexandra Trzeciak-Duval, currently chief of the Division of Policy Coordination at the OECD, spoke about the problems of vulnerable states. She focused in particular on the basic principles of the role of the international community vis-a-vis these states. Her presentation was followed by that of Serge Michailof, formerly Director of Operations at the French Agency of International Development. His presentation also focused on vulnerable states, with a special focus on the situation in Afghanistan, with which he is very familiar, having carried out many missions in that country during his last three years working for the World Bank.

The General Assembly also elected six members of the Board of the French Chapter. The new Board is scheduled to meet on June 5 to designate the five officers of the Bureau.

Please note that I plan to send the next two issues of the Bulletin to the print shop on Thursday July 16, 2009, and Thursday, September 17, 2009.


