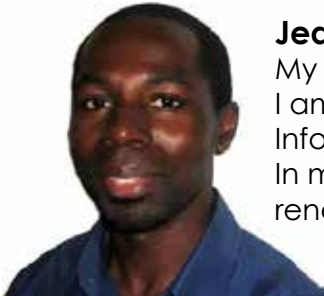
Guy, book buyer
