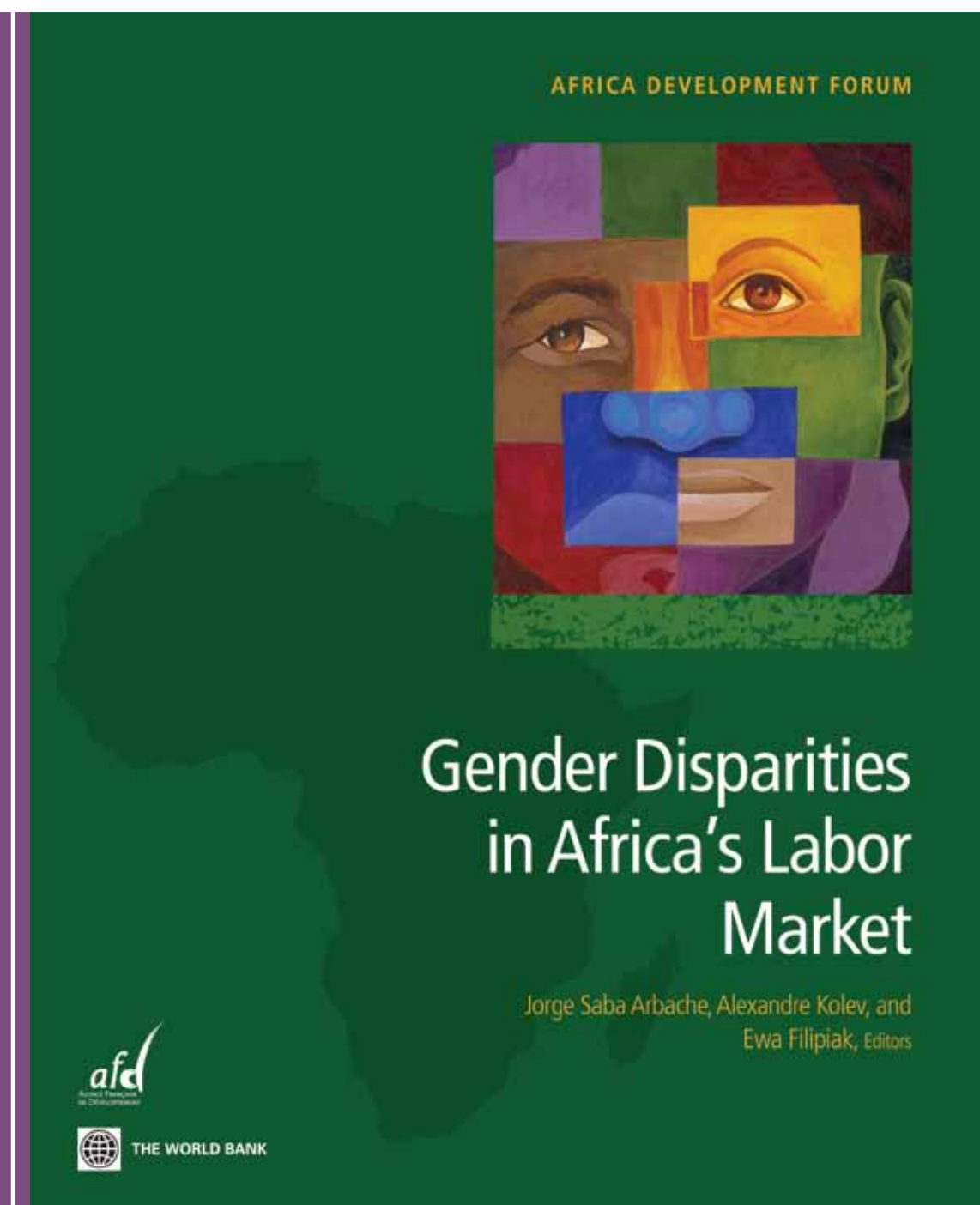


## Gender Disparities in Africa's Labor Markets

*Nature, extent, and root causes of labor disadvantages facing African women*

In the early 2000s, women's weekly earnings as a fraction of male earnings were 79% in Ghana, 51% in Nigeria, 45% in Mozambique, and 23% in Burkina Faso. It is tempting to conclude that this is a sign of discrimination. This study shows that the wage gap is a reflection of many factors, from labor market conditions to attitudes in the household.
