<p>Building Dialogue with Government and Consensus Building/Negotiation The course develops skills on dialogue and consensus-building as applied to natural resources management cases. It facilitates understanding of the natural resources governance in the Cambodian context. It identifies opportunities for dialogue and consensus-building and imparts communication skills and tools, including listening skills, language and emotions. <p>Participatory Planning and Local Governance The course aims to strengthen participants' understanding on Local Self Governance and role of civil society in ensuring the same. With the assistance of illustrations and interactive exercises, the course will strengthen participants' perspectives on participatory planning processes and methodologies, within the context of local self-governance. <p>Procurement and Fund tracking of national Ministries The course showcases civil society initiatives that had been used to track the expenditures of different national agencies in the Philippines. It will feature experiences in tool development, collaboration with government, networking and mobilization of citizens. <p>Communication and Use of Media The Course will facilitate understanding on different modes of communication and how they can contribute in ensuring social accountability. The focus will be on understanding the relevance and role of Media in holding the state and market accountable.
