Randeep Sudan, Senior ICT Policy Specialist, CITPO, World Bank

Randeep Sudan joined the World Bank in 2005 as a Senior ICT Policy Specialist. He is currently working on ICT projects in Africa, Central Asia and South Asia. His areas of expertise include ICT policy, e-government, investment promotion, infrastructure development and public-private partnerships. Prior to joining the World Bank he held senior positions in the Government of Andhra Pradesh as a member of the Indian Administrative Service. He was a key member of Chief Minister Naidu's team for nearly 9 years (1995-2004). As Special Secretary to the Chief Minister and ex-officio Secretary Information Technology, he was closely associated with policies and strategies for leveraging ICT for development. He also has worked as a consultant with the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank and has been a professor at the Department of Informatics of the University of Oslo. He has an MSc in Social Policy and Planning from the London School of Economics and an MA in Economics from the Jawaharlal Nehru University.

Ismail Radwan, Senior PSD Specialist, SASFP, World Bank

Ismail Radwan is a Senior PSD Specialist in South Asia Finance and Private Sector Development Unit. He has been based in Colombo, Sri Lanka since January 2005 in order to effectively supervise the e-Sri Lanka project from the field as a task team leader. He manages several other Bank projects in the region. Ismail has a background as a management consultant as well as working in the Ministry of Finance in Namibia from 1993-1996. He holds an undergraduate degree in economics from Oxford and a master's degree from Wharton.

Eloy Eduardo Vidal, Regional Telecommunications Coordinator, Latin America and the Caribbean, CITPO, World Bank

Mr. Vidal assists Governments of several Latin American countries in restructuring their telecommunications sector by: (1) privatization of the state-owned telecommunications enterprises; (2) introduction of competition; (3) preparation of new telecommunications laws and regulations; (4) supporting regulatory institutions; (5) financing radio spectrum management and control systems; and (5) developing Universal Access Programs to extend services to the rural areas. He also supports Governments to extend the use of Information and Communication Technologies to improve delivery of Government services: computers in schools, health center systems, e-government and e-commerce applications. Eloy joined the World Bank in 1986. Previously, he was Technical Director of COMTELCA, the Central American Regional Telecommunications Commission, from 1982 to 1986. He was also Manager of Telecommunications Operations of Instituto Costarricense de Electricidad (the national telephone company), in San José, Costa Rica, from 1968 to 1982. Eloy has a Master of Science in Electrical Engineering from Stanford University and an Electrical Engineer Degree from University of Costa Rica.
