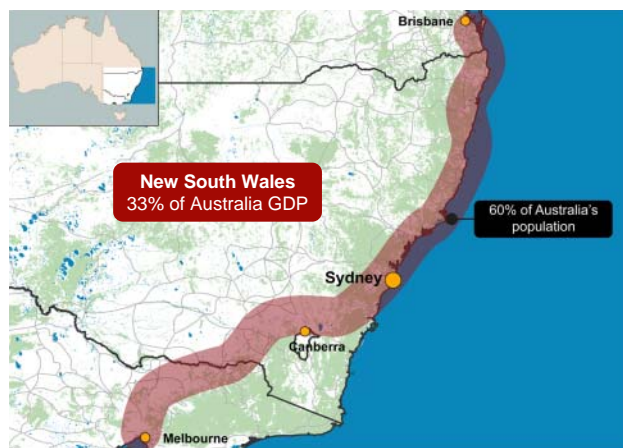

NSW – a \$355bn economy

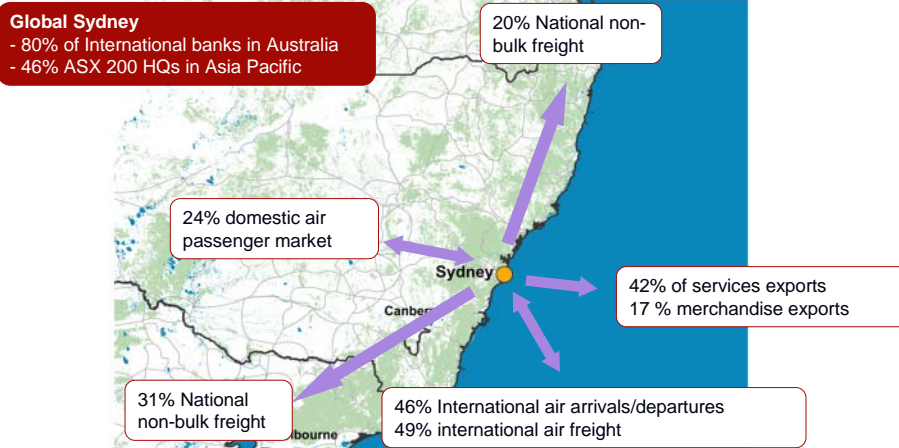

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Sydney – a global city

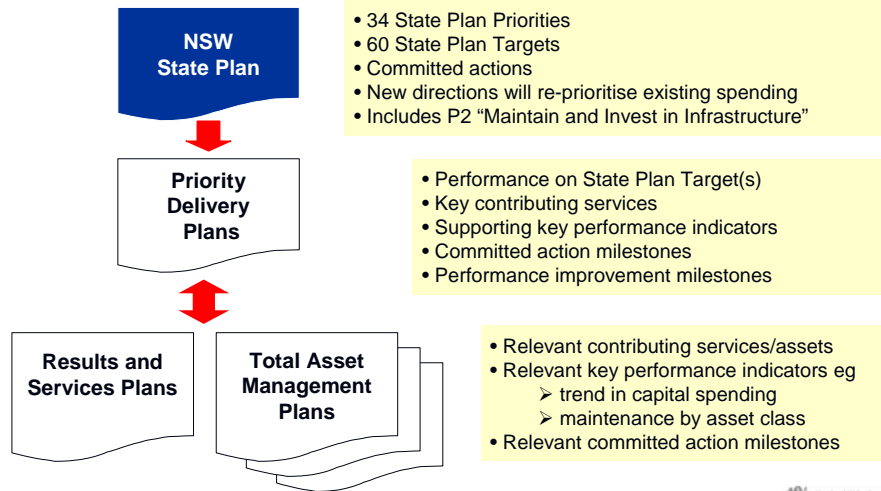


Sydney, NSW – a national and international hub

NSW GOVERNMENT The Strategic Framework

- State Plan
- State Infrastructure Strategy
- Innovation Statement
- Metropolitan and Regional Strategies
- Urban Transport Statement
- Metropolitan Water Plan
- Other strategies such as regional and subregional strategies
- Linked to budget processes

Role of DPC – Coordination in NSW

- Support private sector project proponents
- Assist and encourage private sector investment in major projects and infrastructure
- Facilitate the interface on major projects between government and non-government proponents
- Guide and expedite the delivery of key government infrastructure projects

Three key functional areas

- Investment and Economic Development
- Infrastructure Management and Implementation
- Urban and Regional Infrastructure Strategies

Key strategies for 2008-09

- Assist government agencies to deliver State infrastructure projects
- Provide interface with private sector and business community on behalf of the Government
- Ensure coordination and alignment between planning, investment and delivery
- Assist with resolution of whole-of-government issues relating to development, approvals and delivery of infrastructure
- Coordinate NSW response to the national "Infrastructure Australia" agenda
- Management and reporting of the key project and policy program (see next slide)

Current transport project & policy program

- Freight, ports & intermodals
- Transport – Urban Transport Statement, CBD metro, West metro*, M4 extension, M5 duplication* rail noise
- Land Development – Growth Centres, land release and infrastructure issues
- Commercial / industrial property – Barangaroo, Exhibition & Convention Review, Sydney Opera House
- CEO's Economic Forum
- Unsolicited proposals – manage current proposals & develop improved process
 - * feasibility projects with State and Federal Government (budget 2008/09) funding (\$45m)

NSW Planning Legislation Community Consultation

NSW Environmental Planning & Assessment Act
comprises 6 Parts:

- Administration
- Environmental Planning Instruments
- 3A. Major Infrastructure and Other Projects
- Development Assessment
- Environmental Assessment
- Implementation and Enforcement.

Extensive community consultation is required in respect of
Parts 3, 3A, 4 and 5

Part 3A – major infrastructure and other projects

- Publicly exhibited as of significant public interest.
- Statutory period for exhibition.
- Minister will often exhibit longer than statutory period if it is a really major or controversial project – eg Desalination Plant at Kurnell
- Proponent prepares preferred project report after receiving public submissions. This is also usually exhibited (not for comment unless a significant change to the project which warrants re-exhibition).
- Projects can be either public/Govt projects (eg motorway, hospital) or private (eg major housing development).
- “Critical Infrastructure” declaration and gazettal (minister will declare cabinet consultation) consultation and comments but no requirement alter plan.
- The consent authority is usually the Minister.
